committee recently a modern and well equipped hospital in the heart of Columbia, a hospital already in operation and with a reputation and a business. The committee immediately took the hospital over and the South Carolina Baptist Hospital was opened on September 1st. In the first five weeks of its work it cared for more than one hundred sick folk, and did about five hundred dollars worth of charity work. So far, the hospital has been self-sustaining, paying all expenses, and whatever money is contributed for charity work goes directly to that purpose without any cost of administration.

It is said of our Saviour that He "went about all Galilee, teaching in their synagogues, and preaching the gospel of the kingdom, and healing all manner of sickness and all manner of diseases among the people." As a great denomination we have for many years been teaching and preaching, but we have not followed our Saviour's example of ministering to the bodies of men. At last we have launched upon this Christian work, and the Baptist hospital in Columbia opens up to the Baptists of South Carolina a great opportunity for service to suffering humanity, service that shall honor and glorify our Lord. In addition to the treatment of cases which come to the hospital, there will be nurse's training school which shall train nurses to minister to the suffering in the homes of our people in the spirit and service of the Christ.

The Board takes pleasure in announcing to the brotherhood that brother J. J. Gentry has accepted the position of Superintendent of the hospital and will begin his work there on the first of November. He is well fitted for his work, is known and honored throughout the State, and we bespeak for him the hearty support and co-operation of the brethren of the State.

The Baptist Hospital stands ready to serve the people. It takes a place in the regular program of the Association and an interest in the prayers of the people of God. It offers a fine opportunity for those who wish to minister to the suffering who are not able to pay for themselves. Contributions for charity work will be gladly received and faithfully administered.

The Report upon Young People's Work was read by C. T. Dowling; discussed by him; and then adopted.

Young People's Work.

We, your Committee, beg to bring to the attention of the Association the scarcity of organization of our young people. So far as is known to your Committee, there is not a single regularly organized B. Y. P. U. in the bounds of the Association. We wish to urge the necessity of this work. The young men need the training.

We have 20 Y. W. A. organizations, 9 Sunbeam Bands, and 2 R. A. Chapters. This shows that the young ladies are doing better work than the young men. It also shows that the Sunbeams and R. A.'s were not cared for for awhile and thereby allowed to grow up in neglect. Here is a great field for work.

The Report upon Digest of Letters was read, and discussed, by B. F. Halford, and then adopted.

Digest of Letters.

We have 34 Churches enrolled in the Association. Of these, only 21 report by Letter, and one reported by Delegate without Letter—Boxman.

We regret to note that two Churches report no Sunday School; and three reporting Sunday Schools give no statistics of their schools—only giving the names of Superintendents.

There are ten Churches reporting no Woman's Missionary Society; and none report B. Y. P. U.'s.

We note an increase of membership to the Churches reporting, as follows; by Baptism, 130; by Letter, 96; Restored, 24; total, 250.

We find one Church reporting nothing for State Missions, as against four reporting nothing last year. The Churches report \$64.11 less raised for State Missions than last year.

There are three Churches reporting nothing raised for Home Missions this year, as against three reporting nothing last year. These Churches report \$101.98 less this year than last.

Four Churches report nothing given to Foreign Missions this year, as against three last year. These Churches reporting report \$198.56 less raised this year than last for Foreign Missions.

Two Churches report nothing raised for the Orphanage this year, as against two last year. The Letters show \$172.92 less for the Orphanage.

Four Churches report nothing given to Aged Ministers this year, as against twelve reporting nothing last year. The amount raised this year is \$26.34 less than last year.

Eleven report nothing given to Ministerial Education, as against eighteen reporting nothing last year.

There are only four that report anything given to the Board of Education—this being a new Board.

Only one Church reported anything raised for Seminary Endowment—\$10.00.

There are two Churches that report funds raised for the Orangeburg College.

We find that the Beaver Creek Church is in need of assistance in building a house of worship. We recommend that the Association give such assistance as they deem proper.

We are pleased to note that the Ebenezer Church reports a goodly number of the elder people enrolled in their Sunday School, and the organization of the Y. W. A. and R. A.; also the weekly prayer meeting. All of which we commend.

We further recommend that our financial year close with the 30th day of September; and that the Churches fill out their Church Letters and forward them to the Book of the Association on the 1st day of October, or as soon thereafter as possible.

Report of Trustees of Orangeburg Collegiate Institute to Orangeburg Association, October 15, 1914.

On September 16th, 1914, the Orangeburg Collegiate Institute opened for its Twenty-First Annual Session. The number of students in attendance was so small that it was hardly possible to pay half of the running expenses of the school. Confronted by this situation, and not knowing where to obtain financial aid under present conditions, the Trustees were compelled to close the Institution; and, in order to avert impending litigation, we took steps to put the property in the hands of a Receiver.

While the Trustees deeply deplore the necessity of their action, they could see no way to do otherwise; and they hereby place the matter in the hands of the Association for further guidance.
